# J. A. Robin Appointed Public Administrator

## Loys Charbonnet To Succeed **Dimitry** As Attorney

Governor Pleasant has recommissioned James A. Robin, of this city, public administrator to succeed Peter J. Flanagan. This appointment has been held up since early in the Pleasant administration because when Gov. Pleasant appointed M. J. Cunningham, vice Mr. Flanagan, "removed for cause," Mr. Flanagan went into court and enjoined the appointment. Mr. Cunningham died during this litigation. Jan. 3, 1917, Gov. Pleasant appointed Mr. Robin and the same suit resulted. In it, however, Mr. Flanagan claimed that his term did not expire until March 4, 1918, and it is now believed the suits have ended by limitation, and that there will be no further contest. Mr. Robin is vice president and cashier of the Bank of Orleans. He resigned as a member of the Charity Hospital Board to accept this commission.

Some unusual incidents attended this case. On the very day and hour that the first Flanagan suit came to trial before Judge Skinner, Attorney Hugh C. Cage appeared before the bar and announced the death of Mr. Cunningham.

The second suit fell to Judge Ellis, who decided in favor of Flanagan. The case was appealed, but on joint motion of both counsel it was dismissed in the supreme court, March 4, the day Flanagan's term expired by his own pleading.

Loys Charbonnet, well known among the younger members of the bar, will succeed M. D. **Dimitry** as attorney for the public administrator.
