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The wounded soldiers of the Sixth Massachusetts Regiment, now in the Infirmary here, held a meeting on Tuesday morning, at which the following preamble and resolutions were adopted :

Whereas, at an assemblage of that portion of the Sixth Regiment of Massachusetts volunteers who were wounded while passing through the city of Baltimore on Friday, the 19th instant, and now confined at the Washington Infirmary, feeling their deep sense of gratitude for the many acts of kindness shown them, it was unanimously

Resolved, That our heartfelt thanks be extended to the officers, surgeons, and Sisters of Mercy of this institution for their gentle and sympathetic attention to us; the Rev. P. Fisk, Chaplain in the U. S. Navy, for his kind donation of the National Republican every morning; Rev. J. C. Smith, for pocket editions of the Testament; the gentlemen who have formed themselves into an Association for the Relief of the Massachusetts troops; and the ladies who called upon us on our arrival here, with amiable and characteristic proffers of willing hands and humane hearts, to add to our comfort and well-being; and to all who have visited and given us their sympathy and the warm grasp of a friend's hand. These are acts which will dwell with our latest breath. And may it be the good providence of us all to reciprocate these attentions, if not in a private and unostentatious manner, in such a way that there will be no doubt in the minds of any one of the gratitude and silent thanks that dwell within the heart of a Massachusetts soldier.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the officer in charge of the Washington Infirmary, to the Revs. P. Fisk and J. C. Smith, to the Massachusetts Association of Relief, and to be published in the National Republican and the Evening Star.
