PROM SMYRNA.

Brig Caspian, arrived yesterday from Smyrna and Gibraltar. Sailed from the former July 15 under convoy of the U. S. ship Ontario. In the Gulf of Smyrna spoke U. S. sch. Porpoise, bound up. All well on board the U. S. squadron. The North Carolina, 74, and frigate Constitution, were at Mytilene, on their return from Tenedos, where the Capt. Pacha partook of a sumptuous entertainment on board Com. Rodgers' ship, and paid many handsome compliments to the American Nation. One division of the Turkish Fleet, consisting of 13 sail, including one 74 wearing the Capt. Pacha's flag, was entering the Gulf of Smyrna July 17. It was conjectured they would take in troops, at Smyrna, and make an attack on the island of Samos.

The other division of the Turkish Fleet, consisting of two 74's, 11 frigates, 8 sloops of war, and 3 brigs, was at Modon, which the Turkish Army, under Ibrahim Pacha, entered about the 6th of June, with several thousand prisoners.—It is probable their next movement will be for the island of Hydra. The Greek Fleet, or the greatest part of it, was at Hydra at the last accounts.—Boston Palladium.
