**STEPHANINI.**—The editor of the N. Y. Daily Advertiser has received the following letter from this young Greek:

“**MESSINA, 26th Dec. 1829.**

“I wrote you from Marseilles, by Captain Jones, of the brig Elbe. Eight days after our arrival at that place, I was so fortunate as to find the brig Danube, bound to this port. I was introduced to Capt. William Beecher, by my good friend, Capt. George W. Lee, of the ship Six Brothers, and cannot express my gratitude for the kind attention which I have received from him. Capt. Beecher disinterestedly offered to give me a passage, and has treated me like a brother—his kindness I can never repay.

“On our arrival here yesterday, after a passage of 7 days, I delivered a letter of introduction to the American Consul, Mr. George L. Payson, and showed him my letter of recommendation from the President of the United States. He received me very kindly, and assisted me in expediting my departure from this place. I learn from him that Mr. Stuyvesant was here four days since, on his return from Greece, and very ill. I have taken passage in a vessel to sail directly for Corfu—the brig Industria, Capitano Vinella, of Genoa. In this, I consider myself very fortunate; and I hope, by divine assistance, to effect my object soon. I learn nothing important from my countrymen here, concerning Greece.

“I could wish to express my thanks to all my friends in the United States.”
