Dr. A. C. Zenos, Minister, Dies Of Pneumonia

Presbyterian's Long Career Ends at 81 After Brief Illness

Dr. Andrew C. Zenos, 86, prominent Chicago theologian, died of pneumonia last night in Presbyterian Hospital following a short illness. He lived at 834 West Chalmers place.

Born of Greek parents in Constantinople, Aug. 13, 1855, Dr. Zenos came to the United States as a young man. For 60 years he served as a Presbyterian minister, 50 of them as a member of the faculty of the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, 2330 North Halsted street.

Dr. Zenos became dean of the seminary in 1920 and has been dean emeritus since his retirement in 1939. He was credited with having had a prominent part in recent expansion of the school, formerly the McCormick Seminary.

From 1916 to 1941, Dr. Zenos was stated clerk of the Chicago Presbytery.

How Name Was Adopted.

A story is told, to which Dr. Zenos gave only smiling attention, that he was left an orphan in Turkey at such an early age that he did not know and never could learn his family name. He chose Zenos, the Greek word for stranger.

He remained in Turkey long enough to be graduated from Robert College, Constantinople, in 1872, and to become a tutor there. He was graduated from the Princeton Theological Seminary in 1880.

While serving in a ministry at Brandt, Pa., he met and married Miss Ruth J. Schlager.

Author of Religious Works.

Dr. Zenos was the author of numerous historical and theological works. The latest is "Presbyterianism in America."

Surviving the the widow; three daughters, Mrs. Julia Linnell of Chicago, Mrs. Clinton W. Lowrie of St. Paul, Minn., and Mrs. Elliott D. Parkhill of Lansdowne, Pa., and four grandchildren.
